The best choice is not simply the course with the highest advertised salary. Consider your interests, working style, local opportunities, physical requirements, schedule, and willingness to keep learning.

SHORTLIST RULE

Choose three paths. Take the free introduction for each. Then compare the daily work, course requirements, job openings near you, and the proof of skill you can create.

Turn interest into a decision

DAY 1	Select three career paths from the list.
DAY 2	Search local and remote job boards for entry-level titles connected to each path. Record recurring skills and requirements.
DAY 3	Take the free introduction for your first-choice path. Write down what the actual work involves.
DAY 4	Review the curriculum, estimated time commitment, technology needs, total price, refund terms, and any outside certifications or licenses.
DAY 5	Compare the program with at least one alternative training route. Decide which offers the clearest practical path for you.
DAY 6	Update your resume with transferable skills from previous jobs, education, volunteer work, military service, or projects.
DAY 7	Choose: enroll, keep researching, or test another free introduction. A clear no is better than buying the wrong course.

JOB-READY MEANS SHOWING THE WORK

Training can help you learn. You still need to complete the work, build proof of skill, present yourself professionally, apply consistently, interview well, and meet employer requirements.
